Vicar's Versus

I've spent some time traveling the past two months, which is something I haven't really had the chance to do since I started seminary. I spent two and a half weeks in Tanzania in January and, as I'm writing this, I'm at a conference in Atlanta, GA. In this time of travel, I've also spent a lot of time with people who are from very different social locations than me. (A person's social location is made up of a combination of factors including gender, race, social class, age, ability, religion, sexual orientation, and geographic location.)

In Tanzania, some of these differences are very clear. Geographic location, race, and even social class differences seem obvious. However, even something that feels like it should be the same, like Christianity, can come across very differently. There are aspects of worship that many Lutheran churches in the US don't have, the style of the church building is different, and services can last over 3 hours!



I'm currently at the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Clergy and Lay Leadership Conference, whose mission is "to nurture, sustain, and mobilize the African American faith community in collaboration with civic, corporate, and philanthropic leaders to address critical needs of human rights and social justice within local, national, and global communities." Even though the majority of those attending the conference are American, there are still many notable differences in our social locations. Again, even in our expressions Christianity, things can feel different. I haven't been to many Lutheran churches in Minnesota where people in the congregation shout out during the sermon. (Maybe you can change that next time I'm preaching!)

During these last two months, one thing I've constantly been reminded of is this: despite all of our differences, especially in the different ways we express our faith, we are all still deeply connected with one another. God has made a diverse creation, and God is still creating diversity. And this is something to be celebrated! In that beauty of diversity, in the many different ways we worship God all around the world, let us be reminded that God is present with each and every one of us. Our expressions of Christianity may look and feel different, but our God is still the same.

Praise the Lord Jesus. In Swahili, Bwana Yesu Asifiwe.
